#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

THAT THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WELLAND receives for information Report P&B 2023-14 regarding applications for Official Plan Amendment (OPA No. 43) and Zoning By-law Amendment (2023-02) for lands on the north side of Thorold Road, west side of Rice Road and east of Bridlewood Drive, municipally known as 392 & 398 Thorold Road.

### ORGIN AND BACKGROUND

Applications for Official Plan Amendment and Zoning By-law Amendment were submitted by A. Arbour Consulting on behalf of PBG Group (Anthony Continelli) on February 6, 2023. The applications was deemed complete on March 4, 2023.

The purpose of the application for Official Plan Amendment (see Appendix II) is to redesignate 392 & 398 Thorold Road from Low Density Residential to Medium Density Residential (Special Policy). The application for Zoning By-law Amendment has been submitted to rezone 392 & 398 Thorold Road from Residential Low Density 1 – RL1 to Residential Medium Density – RM.

The purpose of the applications for Official Plan Amendment and Zoning By-law Amendment are to permit the construction of sixty-nine (69) residential dwelling units.

## **COMMENTS AND ANALYSIS:**

A Virtual/In-Person Public Information Meeting was held on April 12, 2023 to gain public input regarding the proposed applications. No members of the public participated at the Public Information Meeting.

At the time of writing this report no written correspondence from the public has been received in reference to the submitted applications.

The Statutory Public Meeting under the <u>Planning Act</u> is being held on May 2, 2023. The Public Meeting provides an opportunity for the Applicant to make a presentation regarding the applications and proposal, for interested parties to make comment and/or raise concerns, and for Council members to inquire about the applications.

The report is intended to provide Council with background information on the applications. Staff will bring a Recommendation Report for Council's consideration at a future meeting.

## **FINANCIAL CONSIDERATION:**

All costs with the development of the property will be the responsibility of the developer.

## OTHER DEPARTMENT IMPLICATIONS:

Other City Divisions have been circulated the application for review and comment. Any comments, requirements, and/or recommendations received will be incorporated into the final Recommendation Report.

## **SUMMARY AND CONCLUSION:**

The Planning Act requires a Statutory Public Meeting to be held to provide an opportunity for public input and discussion regarding the applications. This report is intended to provide background information for the Public Meeting.



AND WHEREAS the Council of the Corporation of the City of Welland deems it expedient to amend the Official Plan.

**AND WHEREAS** the Regional Municipality of Niagara is the approval authority for Amendments to the Official Plan of the Corporation of the City of Welland.

AND WHEREAS the Regional Municipality of Niagara has exempted Official Plan Amendment No. XX to the Official Plan of the Corporation of the City of Welland from approval in accordance with the Memorandum of Understanding between the Regional Municipality of Niagara and the Corporation of the City of Welland.

# NOW THEREFORE THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF WELLAND ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. That the Corporation of the City of Welland hereby adopts and approves Official Plan Amendment No. XX for the Corporation of the City of Welland.
- 2. That staff is hereby authorized and directed to give Notice of Council's adoption of Amendment No. XX to the Official Plan of the Corporation of the City of Welland in Accordance with Section 17 (23) of the Planning Act.

PART "A" - THE PREAMBLE (This does not constitute part of the Amendment)

### TITLE AND COMPONENTS

This document, when approved in accordance with Section 17 and 21 of The Planning Act, 1990, shall be known as Amendment No. XX to the Official Plan of the Corporation of the City of Welland.

Part "A", the Preamble, does not constitute part of this Amendment.

Part "B", the Amendment, consisting of the following text and map (designated Schedule "A") constitutes Amendment No. XX to the Official Plan of the Corporation of the City of Welland.

Part "C", the Appendices, which do not constitute part of this Amendment, contains the background data, planning considerations and public involvement associated with this Amendment.

#### **PURPOSE OF THIS AMENDMENT**

The purpose of Official Plan Amendment No. XX is to redesignate the lands shown on the attached Schedule "A" from Low Density Residential to Medium Density Residential – Special Policy X.

#### **LOCATION OF THIS AMENDMENT**

The lands subject to this Amendment are located at 392 and 398 Thorold Road, Welland, legally described as Plan 13 Lot 1 to Lot 3 NP 936 in the City of Welland, Regional Municipality of Niagara.

#### **BASIS**

The subject lands are within the urban area boundary for the City of Welland and currently designated Low Density Residential. There is currently a single detached dwelling situated on the subject lands. A proposal has been put forth to redevelop the lands to permit the construction of 69 townhouse units, stacked.

#### PART "B" - THE AMENDMENT

All of this part of the document entitled "Part B" — "The Amendment" consisting of the following policies and attached maps designated as Schedule "A"—Land Use Plan and Policies constitute Amendment No. XX to the Official Plan of the Corporation of the City of Welland. The Official Plan for the City of Welland is hereby amended as follows:

### **POLICY CHANGES**

Policy 4.2.2.3.A is deleted and replaced with the following:

#### 4.2.2.3.A Planned Function

The Medium Density Residential designation is intended to provide housing for residential development at a minimum density of 25 dwelling units per net hectare of land and a maximum density of 85 dwelling units per net hectare of land.

#### **MAP CHANGES**

The area indicated on the attached Schedule A as Amendment No. XX is hereby redesignated from "Low Density Residential" to "Medium Density Residential – Special Policy X" on Schedule B1 to the Official Plan.







The Canada Community Revitalization Fund (CCRF) aims to help communities across Canada build and improve community infrastructure projects so they can rebound from the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic. With a national investment of \$500 million over 2 years, the fund will support not-for-profit organizations, municipalities and other community groups, as well as Indigenous communities to:

- build new community infrastructure and revitalize existing assets
- bring people back to public spaces safely as health measures ease
- create jobs and stimulate local economies

## Canada Community Revitalization Fund in southern Ontario

The fund is being delivered by Canada's <u>regional development agencies</u> (RDAs). Eligible applicants can submit an application as of June 23, 2021.

## Indigenous applicants

Indigenous applicants are invited to apply through the process described below for projects of all types and sizes. Under the fund, RDAs can contribute up to 100% funding for projects with Indigenous groups.

## Eligible applicants

- Not-for-profit organizations or charities
- Any municipal or regional government, or bodies providing infrastructure services to communities (e.g., municipalities, rural communities, local service districts, public-sector bodies)
- Indigenous-led not-for-profits and organizations

NOTE: Individuals, businesses and provincial or territorial governments are **not** eligible to apply to the CCRF.

## **Eligible activities**

The fund will provide support to:

- adapt community spaces and assets so that they may be used safely in accordance with local public-health guidelines
- 2. build or improve community infrastructure to encourage Canadians to re-engage in and explore their communities and regions.

Eligible projects will be prioritized in the following order:

- revitalize downtown cores and main streets
- reinvent outdoor spaces
- create green infrastructure
- increase the accessibility of community spaces

Examples may include projects involving:

- downtown cores and main streets
- green projects and projects that reduce environmental impacts
- improvement of accessibility
- farmers' markets
- community and cultural centres
- · museums and libraries
- public outdoor community sports facilities and spaces
- · waterfront and tourism facilities
- multi-purpose centres
- other existing community facilities for public benefit that have a local community impact and underpin local economies

Further priority will be given to projects that:

- are shovel ready
- bring in other partners to leverage project funding
- are of a smaller scope, where the project will be completed quickly so the program benefits will be shared broadly
- help communities rebound from the effects of the pandemic and contribute to the reanimation of communities, towns and cities
- can demonstrate measurable direct or indirect social-economic benefits
- encourage the participation of under-represented groups and take into consideration the unique challenges of rural and remote communities

Other projects will be considered if funds remain available.

## **Eligible costs**

Eligible costs include reasonable and necessary expenses associated with the activities listed above. This includes, but is not limited to, construction materials and contractor fees for building or improving a community asset. A full list of eligible and non-eligible costs will be included in contribution agreements.

## Canada Community Revitalization Fund in southern Ontario Ineligible costs

Ineligible costs include expenses associated with maintenance and operational activities that typically need to be undertaken on a recurring/annual basis; motorized vehicles; the purchase of a building, and land.

## **Application intake streams**

#### 1. Scheduled intake:

A one-time special scheduled intake will focus on eligible projects that are ready to proceed. Initial screening will begin during the 4 week period. Assessment of applications will begin on July 23, 2021 (23:59). Applicants are strongly encouraged to submit their applications by this date.

#### 2. Continuous intake:

Should there be remaining funding after the scheduled intake period, applications will continue to be accepted and funded on a continuous intake basis over the next 2 years or until such a time as the allocated funding is fully distributed.

## Financial support

CCRF contributions will be determined based on the minimum amount required to carry out a project and may represent up to 75% of total eligible costs. Recipients could receive up to \$750,000 per project across provinces. In order to reflect higher construction costs and a shorter construction season, recipients in territories may receive up to \$1 million in territories. RDAs may also contribute up to 100% funding for projects with Indigenous groups. All contributions will be non-repayable.

#### **RECOMMENDATIONS:**

- 1. THAT THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WELLAND enters into an agreement with the registered owner of 5 Forks Road in the City of Welland as described herein for the transfer of a new easement in favour of the municipality; and
- 2. THAT Council direct staff to transfer, release and abandon the existing easement with the registered owner of 5 Forks Road in the City of Welland as described herein; and
- 3. THAT Council directs staff to prepare the necessary by-law and documents to execute the agreements; and further
- 4. THAT Council authorizes the Mayor and Clerk authorize all necessary documents to execute the agreements.

#### ORIGIN AND BACKGROUND:

During the detailed design of Forks Road two concerns were identified at #5 Forks Road. Firstly, the property, located at the southeast corner of the intersection of Forks Road and Kingsway, has an existing transfer of easement agreement in place with the City for a 200mm cast iron watermain which extends north to south along the west side of the property.

Secondly, due to congestion in the intersection of Forks Road and Kingsway, new underground traffic signal ducts and plant will need to be installed within a 5m by 4m triangle of property located on the northwest corner of #5 Forks Road. Traffic signals will be installed at the intersection of Kingsway and Forks Road upon completion of the Forks Road Bridge Replacement project.

#### **COMMENTS AND ANALYSIS:**

In an effort to ensure future access to municipal infrastructure, the existing 200mm cast iron watermain within the existing easement was abandoned and a new 300mm PVC watermain was installed in the Kingsway right-of-way.

In response to the need for property to install traffic signal ducts and plant at the northwest corner of #5 Forks Road, a draft reference plan was prepared identifying a new 5m by 4m easement. A draft reference plan has been prepared and enclosed as Appendix 1. Staff recommend that the existing watermain and easement be released in favour of the new easement. The reference plan will be registered prior to the transfer of the easement to the City.

#### FINANCIAL CONSIDERATION:

There are no significant costs anticipated beyond expected legal and registration fees.

#### **OTHER DEPARTMENT IMPLICATIONS:**

The Planning, Legal and Clerks Departments will assist with preparation and execution of the agreements.


#### **SUMMARY AND CONCLUSION:**

Staff recommend that Council enter into a new agreement with the registered owner of 5 Forks Road for the transfer of a new easement for the installation of underground traffic signal ducts and plant.

Staff also recommend that Council direct staff to transfer, release and abandon the existing easement, containing the abandoned 200mm CI watermain, with the registered owner of 5 Forks Road.

#### **ORIGIN AND BACKGROUND:**

Vanier Estates (Phases 1 & 2) Subdivision, Plan 59M-436 (Appendix 1), is located on the west side of Clare Avenue, south of Fitch Street and north of Lynbrook Lane (refer to attached Location Plan (Appendix 2). Phase 1 and 2 of this residential development are comprised of thirty-two (32) lots for single-detached dwelling use. Servicing was completed in accordance with the General Servicing Plan (Appendix 3) in February 2018. The maintenance period concluded in June 2022.

#### **COMMENTS AND ANALYSIS:**

The Developer of the subdivision, 544063 Ontario Inc., has fulfilled their obligations as outlined in the Subdivision Agreement and has submitted all necessary documentation required to support assumption. Furthermore, the Developer's Engineer, Upper Canada Consultants, has certified that the subdivision was constructed to City of Welland standards.

Through the assumption of the subdivision, the City will assume direct responsibility for the operation and maintenance of the municipal infrastructure summarized below.

#### **FINANCIAL CONSIDERATION:**

There are no financial impacts to the Corporation except for future routine maintenance. All security deposits will be released post assumption of the subdivision. There will be no costs incurred by the municipality at this time.

#### **OTHER DEPARTMENT IMPLICATIONS:**

The Infrastructure Services Department is responsible for providing Finance with the approval to release the securities once finalized.

The Public Works Division of the Infrastructure Services Department will now maintain the City owned portions of the development. Staff will be advised of the subdivision assumption and circulated infrastructure details for maintenance purposes.

#### **SUMMARY AND CONCLUSION:**



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

Dear Premier Ford,

At its meeting held on April 3, 2023, St. Catharines City Council approved the following motion:

WHEREAS individuals, families, and businesses in St. Catharines are struggling because of nation and province-wide systemic gaps in addressing homelessness, mental health, and addition; and

WHEREAS the Canada Health Act's primary objective is to protect, promote and restore the physical and mental well-being of residents; and

WHEREAS Niagara Regional Council has adopted a motion to declare mental health, homelessness, and addiction as an emergency; and

WHEREAS the City of St. Catharines has experienced a dramatic increase in individuals living rough throughout the community, both within public spaces as well as derelict and vacant private properties; and

WHEREAS the availability of affordable housing options is rapidly decreasing with St. Catharines having one of the highest rents in Ontario, having increased 19% since 2021 making it harder for families and individuals to find housing, and with no increases to social assistance since 2018, making affordable housing out of reach for many residents; and

WHEREAS St. Catharines City Council adopted a motion from Councillor Miller on March 20, 2023, highlighting the challenges and need for more affordable housing; and

WHEREAS City staff at various levels, from multiple departments, are often taken away from regular duties to coordinate and clean-up encampments and an



increase in the number and size of encampments has led to concerns about the safety and well-being of individuals living rough as well as the impact of the surrounding community and encampments have created additional workload on City crews at the expense of other core service functions due to a shortage of funding and adequate intervention from other levels of government; and

WHEREAS street outreach, emergency shelter, rent allowances, and affordable housing are not able to accommodate the increased number and acuity of clients presenting with significant mental health and addictions needs, and to successfully and sustainably support clients to exit from unsheltered homelessness without intensive health supports in the community or as part of a supportive housing program; and

WHEREAS Indigenous people in Niagara are disproportionately affected by homelessness, mental health and addiction and require specific and culturally relevant support through Indigenous-led interventions, with those who identify as Indigenous representing 22.6% experiencing homelessness, and 10% of overdose deaths (source: Niagara Chapter Native Women Inc.); and

WHEREAS the City of St. Catharines lacks the jurisdiction and the financial and technical resources to meaningfully address systemic gaps in effective service delivery to those experiencing homelessness, mental health, and addiction;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that St. Catharines City Council declare a mental health, homelessness and addiction crisis in the City of St. Catharines; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City call on the federal and provincial governments to declare national and provincial state of emergencies on mental health, homelessness, and addiction that includes direct and culturally relevant support to Indigenous people; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City reaffirm its call for the province to work with all levels of government to provide a comprehensive and long-term financial commitment to create more affordable and supportive housing for people in need, with wraparound services to address the specific needs of those with substance use and mental health needs; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City of St. Catharines call on the provincial government to support local organizations who are attempting to fill systemic gaps through emergency support to individuals and families by covering funding shortfalls to agencies including, but not limited to: Westview Centre for Women, Westminster Church, St. Barnabas Church, The Silver Spire, Start Me Up Niagara, and the Salvation Army; and



BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City ask the Niagara Region and area school boards to continue their commitments on substance abuse public education to St. Catharines with programs like the Overdose Prevention and Education Network of Niagara and provide regular reports and updates on milestones and initiatives, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that where possible the City support community-led initiatives such as Savemylife.ca, to raise awareness and connect individuals and families to available community resources related to mental health and addiction; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City continue to explore innovative approaches to use available policy tools and municipal assets to address the waiting list for affordable housing through the City of St. Catharines Housing Action Plan; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City of St. Catharines condemn the discrimination of the mentally ill, homeless and / or addicted within the community; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that, as part of the Memorandum of Understanding with the Niagara Region Native Centre, the City of St Catharines learn how municipal and other levels of government can support Indigenous-led approaches to addressing mental health, homelessness and addiction serving Indigenous people within the community; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this resolution be circulated to all Niagara area municipalities, the Office of the Premier of Ontario, the Federal Minister of Housing and Diversity and Inclusion, Niagara Area MPPs and MPs, the Ontario Solicitor General, the Association of Municipalities of Ontario, Niagara area school boards; the Congress of Aboriginal Peoples, the Niagara Region Native Centre, the Fort Erie Friendship Centre, the Niagara Peninsula Aboriginal Area Management Board, the Niagara Chapter of Native Women, the Niagara Region Metis Council, Developmental Services Ontario, the Provincial Minister of Community and Social Services, all Niagara-area Community Living Associations (Grimsby / Lincoln / West Lincoln, Fort Erie, Port Colborne / Wainfleet, St. Catharines, Welland / Pelham), Niagara Support Services, the Federal Minister of Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship, and Deputy Prime Minister Chrystia Freeland.
